In return, we expect you to:

- Treat others with courtesy, respect and tolerance, respecting the rights of individuals to hold different beliefs and views and to express them appropriately.
- Engage with your learning programme by attending lessons regularly and punctually, and actively participating in learning activities in line with the Code

of Behaviour for Students (see below)

- Wear lanyards visibly on campus and treat the environment with respect.
- Follow all health & safety procedures in college and work placement environments.

## CWA Code of Behaviour for Students 2023-24

We want everyone to be able to learn and study in a safe, inclusive environment, where individuals feel comfortable to be themselves and interact positively with each other.

The Code of Behaviour for Students applies to all\* students and sets out the general behaviour expectations for all students to help create and maintain a safe, welcoming and inclusive environment which supports you to thrive and fulfil your potential. It has been developed to align and should be read in conjunction with the <u>Student Behaviour Policy</u> and the <u>Equality, Diversity & Inclusion (EDI) Policy and</u> <u>Single Equality Scheme</u>

We expect you to:

- Treat others with kindness, respect and fairness.
- Respect the college environment and other people's property. This includes college buildings and facilities as well as external property (e.g., work placement premises).
- Act as an ambassador for the college in and out of college, particularly on trips or as part of your work experience placement.
- Dress appropriately at college (including during online sessions) and not wear clothing that may offend, antagonise or make others feel uncomfortable. This would include clothing which is overly-revealing (e.g. exposing underwear) and clothing with discriminatory, explicit or sexual slogans or images. Clothing or headwear that obscures the face should not normally be worn on college premises, particularly indoors. We support the wearing of clothing for religious purposes.
- Always wear your lanyard with ID card visible.
- Wear the correct safety clothing and/or uniform for your course and follow the health and safety rules in each area.
- Smoke or vape only in designated areas; smoking and vaping are strictly forbidden inside all college buildings.

- Take your learning seriously and do your best in all aspects of your course.
- Be punctual and attend all your timetabled sessions.
- Take an active part in class and complete all homework and assignments on time.
- Engage in class discussions but share your views respectfully and listen to the views of others with tolerance. Always bear in mind how what you say might make others feel.

#### You must not:

- Use inappropriate or offensive language or engage in harassing or bullying behaviour. Discrimination against someone on the basis of any of the Protected Characteristics (age, disability, gender reassignment, marriage and civil partnership, pregnancy, race, religion or belief, sex and sexual orientation) will not be tolerated.
- Engage in disruptive behaviour or disturb others' learning in class; this includes not using mobile phones unless agreed with your teacher in relation to your studies.
- Record audio or video of lessons, other students or staff without permission.
- Consume or carry alcohol or illegal drugs on college premises, and never attend college whilst under the influence of these.
- Carry or bring onto college premises weapons of any kind.

Breaches of any of the above behaviours will be dealt with in accordance with the <u>Student Behaviour Policy</u>. Where behaviour may also be considered criminal or dangerous in nature this may also be reported to the relevant authorities.

CWA takes a zero-tolerance approach to all forms of abuse, especially sexually abusive behaviour, harassment and violence. This also includes abusive and controlling behaviour within relationships, online abuse and bullying. You can be confident in reporting any such incidents to the <u>college safeguarding team</u>; these will be taken seriously and dealt with quickly and confidentially.
